# EDINBURGH, CORSTORPHINE, ST. NINIAN'S PARISH CHURCH (CHURCH OF SCOTLAND)

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

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The Trustees, for the purpose of charity law, have pleasure in presenting their report for year ended 31 December 2023.

#### Constitution

St. Ninian's is a Parish Church within the Church of Scotland serving a community in the Corstorphine area of Edinburgh. A Parish Church exists to serve all the people living within the Parish irrespective of their individual beliefs or religious affiliation. This Church was founded in 1843 as Corstorphine Free Church, a congregation of the newly-established Free Church of Scotland. Renamed Corstorphine United Free Church in 1900, it re-united with the Church of Scotland in 1929 under the name "St Ninian's". This Church is therefore in historical continuity with the Church of Scotland which was created in 1560 by the Parliament of Scotland, its liberties ratified by the Parliament of Scotland in 1592, and its future secured by the Treaty of Union of 1707.

St. Ninian's is within the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian. A Presbytery is the characteristic and fundamental court of the Church of Scotland since it not only directly supervises ministers and Kirk Sessions but also elects those who form the General Assembly. The General Assembly is the highest court of the Church of Scotland and it determines operational matters for all congregations within presbyteries.

# Structure, Governance and Management

In February 2023, after careful consideration and consultation with the congregation, the Kirk Session agreed that the Church of Scotland's standard Unitary Constitution should be adopted, replacing the previous constitutional arrangements; where the spiritual affairs of the congregation were the responsibility of the Kirk Session and the temporal affairs of the congregation were the responsibility of the Deacons' Court. Under the Unitary Constitution responsibility for both spiritual and temporal affairs rests with the Kirk Session alone.

Application was made to The Committee of the General Assembly for permission to adopt the standard unitary constitution. Permission was received on 25th April 2023.

## Kirk Session

The Kirk Session is responsible for all matters affecting the spiritual and temporal welfare of the congregation. It is made up of the Elders of the congregation, who are also Trustees of the Charity. Following the adoption of the Unitary Constitution, in April 2023, the Session became responsible for all non-spiritual aspects of the congregation's life.

The Kirk Session meets at regular intervals during the year. The Minister as Moderator presides over meetings which receive reports from its sub-committees (as noted below) and vote for or against recommendations made by them. Approved recommendations form the basis for future activity. In particular, the Session considers reports and recommendations from the Session Clerk team, Finance Committee, Fabric Committee, the Mission Committee, as well as others. The reports deal with the day-to-day administration of finance, property upkeep, the raising of funds for congregational and charitable purposes and the use of Church premises.

# Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees (Members of the Kirk Session)

New members of the Kirk Session are nominated on the basis of their faith and talents. They receive an induction course to explain the structure and practices of the Session. All are expected to be able to take both a strategic and an operational role in the running of the Church. At a service of Ordination and Admission the newly appointed members confirm that they:

- believe the fundamental doctrines of the Christian Faith;
- promise to seek the unity and peace of this Church;
- uphold the doctrine, worship, government and discipline thereof;
- will take their due part in the administration of its affairs.

## **Induction and Training**

The induction courses aim to explain the structure and practices of the courts of the Church of Scotland and are supported by the availability of specialist trainers from Presbytery.

## Organisational Structure

#### Session Clerk Team

The responsibilities of the Session Clerk are divided among four elders forming the Session Clerk team. The Session Clerk team has two main areas of work: Administration and Pastoral/Worship support. In addition, there are two other areas of work that are covered: Practice and Procedure/Legal, and Relationships with the broader Church (including neighbouring congregations, Presbytery and the General Assembly).

The Session Clerk team meets regularly to review its areas of work and the day to day administration of the Church, co-ordinating the activities of the other committees of the Kirk Session, taking any action required and reporting to the Kirk Session.

#### Mission Committee

The Mission Committee considers means of Christian Outreach to the local community, to the City of Edinburgh and to Scotland. Examples of its work in 2023:

- · Supporting local charities in the Community;
- Supporting Fresh Start, a charity which provides basic domestic items for people who are newly housed by the city council and need such help;
- Supporting Edinburgh City Mission's New Scots Christmas appeal by sponsoring and delivering Christmas Hampers and extending the hand of friendship to refugees in the area;
- Supporting the work of the Church of Scotland to help those needing care.

#### Sunday School and Youth Committee

This Committee supervises and co-ordinates the work with children and young people of the congregation. During 2023, St.Ninian's continued to offer provision for spiritual education during Sunday morning worship for all children depending on the guidelines in force. A Sunday School was available every Sunday for children in the P1 - P7 school years (8 children) and fortnightly for children in secondary school (6 children). Special services for children and young people of all ages were arranged throughout the year in the sanctuary and online.

#### Presbytery Elder

An Elder is appointed to represent the congregation at the meetings of the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian and reports to the Session the work and recommendations of Presbytery. St. Ninian's also has several "Freely-Elected" Elders in Presbytery who engage in many aspects of the work of Presbytery.

#### Other Reports

The Session also listens to reports, from time to time, from Church organisations and others on aspects of Christian worship, Church-based community activities and other Christian Outreach activities such as support for Christian Aid and the Care Van operated by the Bethany Christian Trust.

## **Objectives and Performance**

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of the Christian religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond. It is a condition of membership that a person requires to be admitted on profession of faith, and membership is a requirement for participation in the Courts of the Church.

However, worship is open to all as is the provision of pastoral support and inclusion in Church-based community activities. The Church of Scotland has an "open" communion table to members of any branch of the Church. Outreach of the congregation is for all and not just members.

## Objectives and Performance cont'd

The purposes of the Church are:

- to draw people together in the worship of God; to proclaim Christ as the incarnation of God reconciling the world to Himself;
- to preach the truths and duties contained in the Bible; and to spread the good news of the Gospel by extending God's care and love to the community in mission and pastoral worship;
- to encourage people to join the Church by Profession of Faith;
- · to offer and promote Christian worship, fellowship, instruction, mission and service;
- to bring the ordinances of the Christian religion to the people within its parish;
- to labour for the advancement of God's Kingdom throughout the world.

#### In furtherance of these purposes:

- St. Ninian's provides facilities for worship, fellowship and the enriching of community life.
- St. Ninian's provides regular opportunities for worship and celebration and the teaching of the Christian Faith.
- St. Ninian's provides pastoral care to the people in the parish in times of difficulty, illness, bereavement, crisis and stress. The Minister is frequently called on to conduct funerals of non-members of the congregation, and people who reside out-with the parish boundary a fine example of loving service to the community at large.
- St. Ninian's, through its Minister and team of office bearers, offers spiritual counselling, advice and support to anyone living in the parish.
- St. Ninian's provides appropriate ceremonies to mark or celebrate special points in life baptisms, marriages, funerals; as well as the celebration of local or national events such as thanksgivings and remembrances.
- St. Ninian's provides social and recreational facilities for groups of all ages within the Church and community groups throughout
  the week mothers and toddlers, children and young people, women's groups, men's group, clubs for retired people, badminton
  clubs and many others.
- St. Ninian's also supports the work of religious and charitable bodies beyond the immediate area, that is, the wider work of the Church of Scotland to support a church in every parish; Christian Aid; the Hospice Movement; Fresh Start in Edinburgh; the Bethany Trust; the Rock Trust, the Salvation Army, the Earl Haig Fund and other local charitable projects. Support is given in time, talents and money.

## Achievements and Performance

Some examples of delivering against these purposes over the course of 2023 were:

- St. Ninian's continued to provide weekly worship and fellowship both in the sanctuary and online. The online offering makes use
  of YouTube and Facebook to spiritually interact with its congregation and community. DVD and CD, as well as a printed service
  were also distributed to those who had no internet access.
- St. Ninian's recorded 3 baptisms and 16 funerals.
- Fortnightly teaching of the Christian faith was available through the Sunday Sermon Discussion Group, Bible Studies during Lent and Advent, and introductory courses to eldership and membership.
- Regular pastoral care for members in general, but particularly for the housebound, the elderly, and those facing significant life changes continued to be provided by the minister and the elders.
- The celebration of communion, commemorations and festivals were marked in the sanctuary and online.
- Social, recreational and spiritual facilities such as the Guild, a Shrove Tuesday pancake evening were offered. St. Ninian's also continued to offer the Cosy Corner facility throughout 2023.
- A quarterly magazine, edited and produced in-house, was distributed to approximately 363 homes in the congregation.

The congregation raised £11,466 (2022 - £12,473) for the work of other charities during the year.

The number of members and adherents at 31 December 2023 was 498 (2022 - 520). While the congregational life is currently vigorous, services well attended, and financial donations remain robust, the Kirk Session is concerned that, in common with all Church of Scotland charges, the congregation is ageing, roll numbers are slowly falling, and few young people are coming forward to join the congregation by "Profession of Faith" (see Future Activities below for action planned to address this issue).

#### **Future Activities**

In April 2023 Edinburgh and West Lothian Presbytery published and approved an updated version of their mission plan. Within this plan a three-way union between St Ninian's, St Andrew's Clermiston and St Anne's Corstorphine is called for. However as both the minister of St Ninian's and the minister of St Anne's have an unrestricted tenure, the proposed union cannot be concluded until such time as a minster relinquishes his charge. It has therefore, been agreed between St Ninian's, St Anne's and St Andrew's that as much preparatory work as possible is completed and that we jointly work towards a deferred Union agreement in anticipation of the Union proposal being exercised. To this end we are actively promoting joint activities which include joint worship activities, joint social events and other joint activities among all three parishes.

In addition to these joint activities, the Trustees continue to conduct activities to support and extend our mission to the Parish. These include continuing with our "Friendly Corner" which offers a safe and warm space in which the public can meet, chat and have coffee on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 11am to 1pm. We are also focusing on the encouragement of new members, supporting children and families through the Sunday schools and Family Services, and extending our Pastoral Care activities to meet the needs of less able members and the needs of the wider Parish.

Following the adoption of the Unitary Constitution we are updating our organisational structure, establishing distinctive sub-committees to ensure effective management of the Kirk Session's responsibilities using the resources that are available.

The Trustees continue to be mindful of their responsibilities to the congregation and parish and remain convinced that, in the long term, the Presbytery Plan is in the best interests for the future of the congregation and parish.

#### Financial Review

The results for the year are as set out in the Statement of Financial Activities on pages 9 - 10

# **Principal Funding Sources**

St. Ninian's receives its core funding from its members. Gift-Aid recoveries from members' offerings supplement this income. Other income arises from renting out the Church Halls, investment income and "fund raising" activities.

Members' offerings amounted to £131,542 (2022 - £141,613), including Income Tax recovered under Gift Aid.

## Expenditure

General expenditure increased from £186,552 to £195,506, including amounts spent on the Church and Manse fabric.

## Valuation of Church and Church Halls

Following agreement in April 2023 by the Kirk Session and the Congregation to adopt the Church of Scotland's Unitary Constitution, the Church including Halls, and the Manse are now vested in five of the Trustees, namely the Minister and the Session Clerk team which comprises four members.

The value of the Manse is capitalised at £550,000 following a review by McNeill Maguire and McCreath, Chartered Surveyors, in January 2014.

The Church and Halls were capitalised at an open market value of £500,000 on 31 December 2013.

It cannot be emphasised too strongly that the valuations of the Manse and Church Buildings (i) represent the estimated value of land and buildings (ii) are held as restricted funds for the future benefit of the congregation and are not available for wider purposes and (iii) are subject to volatility depending on future movement of land and property values. Nevertheless, the Trustees are satisfied that they represent a fair and reasonable assessment of the value of the properties vested in them for the purposes of their annual Accounts.

#### **Investment Performance**

The Growth Fund is largely equity-based and is intended for long term investment. This fund aims to provide capital growth. The Income Fund is intended for medium term investment and aims to provide immediate high income with funds invested predominantly in fixed interest securities.

The value of the investments increased by £15,425 (7.61%) during the year and is still above cost.

#### **Risk Policy**

The Trustees recognise the responsibility to assess and manage potential risks to the charity. This involves identifying the major types of risks which the charity faces and assessing the impact and likelihood of occurrence and identifying means of mitigating them.

The major risks have been identified as the risk to the building and contents, risk to members and users involved in the charity and activities.

In identification of the major risks appropriate insurance cover has been taken out to cover all of those risks and is reviewed annually in line with Church of Scotland insurance requirements.

All volunteers receive appropriate training where needed and require the necessary completion of disclosure forms for the roles taken on.

#### Reserves Policy

Unrestricted funds as at 31 December 2023 amounted to £299,989 (2022 - £294,008), which includes £10,000 designated for the refurbishment of church premises. The Trustees consider reserves to be adequate to continue current activities.

Restricted funds of £55,847 (2022 - £55,579) are set aside to meet future costs (see note 15).

#### Reference and Administration Information

#### Trustees

St. Ninian's is administered by the Kirk Session.

The Kirk Session, comprised of the Minister and Church Elders, is responsible for the spiritual and temporal affairs within the Church.

Following agreement in April 2023 by the Kirk Session and the Congregation to adopt the Church of Scotland's Unitary Constitution the Deacons' Court was dissolved. Deacons served until 25th April and no deacons chose to become an elder.

# Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

# EDINBURGH, CORSTORPHINE, ST. NINIAN'S PARISH CHURCH (CHURCH OF SCOTLAND) ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

St Ninian's Parish Church is a public benefit entity and an unincorporated charity registered in Scotland (SC016557). Registered address and administrative details can be found on page 6 of these accounts.

Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts, are set out below.

**Basis of preparation** 

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The presentation currency of the financial statements is the Pound Sterling (£).

Fund accounting

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds defined as follows.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Endowment funds are funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income therefrom is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the Trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. The designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the Trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds; any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met; it is probable that the income will be received; and the amount can be measured reliably.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis.

When funds collected for other charities within the year are not paid at the end of accounting period, a liability is recognised. Creditors are classified as current liabilities if they are due within one year.

#### Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and the economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) the general volunteer time of congregational members is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

#### Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

# EDINBURGH, CORSTORPHINE, ST. NINIAN'S PARISH CHURCH (CHURCH OF SCOTLAND) ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

#### Tangible fixed assets

Following adoption in April 2023 of the Church of Scotland's Unitary Constitution, the Church including Halls and the Manse are now vested in five of the Trustees, namely the Minister and the Session Clerk team which comprises four members. No depreciation is charged as, in the opinion of the Trustees, any amounts would be trivial.

Fixtures, fittings and office equipment costing more than £1,000 are capitalised and valued at historical cost. Depreciation is charged on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful life of 4 years less estimated residual value from the year of acquisition.

#### Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. Unrealised gains and losses represent the difference between the market value at the beginning and end of the financial year or, if purchased in the year, the difference between cost and the market value at the end of the year. Realised gains and losses represent the difference between the proceeds on disposal and the market value at the start of the year or cost if purchased in the year.

#### **Taxation**

The church is recognised as a charity for the purpose of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The Church is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

#### Financial instruments

The charity only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and financial liabilities like trade and other accounts receivable and payable.

## Significant judgements and estimates

Preparing the financial statements may require the Trustees to make significant judgements and estimates. The only significant estimate by the Trustees is that buildings owned by the charity remain at the same value as previous external valuations.

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the costs of all ministers' stipends and employers' contributions for national insurance, pension and housing and loan fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review the minimum stipend was £30,135 and the maximum stipend in 5<sup>th</sup> and subsequent years of service - £37,032.
